COP28 - How can we report constructively on the UN Climate Change Negotiations?

The 28th Conference of the Parties (COP28) will take place in Dubai from 30 November to 12 December 2023. For the first time, the Global Stocktake, a review of the states' collective performance in meeting their own climate protection goals so far, is being prepared. The results are to be presented in Dubai and it is already clear that the global pressure to act on climate change has by no means diminished. The Paris Agreement has introduced an innovative but also intricate international legal architecture to achieve the ambitious goals in global climate protection. It is not easy for the media and the general public to understand how the UN climate negotiations work and what strengths and limitations the Paris Agreement has as a central instrument for global climate protection efforts.

This seminar is designed primarily for journalists working in Africa. However media people and civil society representatives from other parts of the world will also find the content useful.
